OfficerID: jalbanese, Narrative

On 1/8/19 at 1815 hours Ptl. Melia #267 and I responded to the area of Midstreams Rd. and River Park Dr. in reference to a vehicle stopped in the middle of the roadway. Police dispatch relayed they received a motor vehicle complaint for an erratic driver operating an Acura RDX (NJ #SR714Z) which ultimately stopped in the middle of the roadway.

Upon my arrival I observed the suspect vehicle running but stopped in the lane of travel with a female subject sitting at the wheel. I made contact with the caller who was attempting to speak with the driver of the Acura but he stated the driver was not able to speak. I made contact with the driver, Jessica Smith who could not form sentences as I asked what she was doing. I could detect the odor of an alcoholic beverage emitting from her breath and her eyes appeared bloodshot and watery as I tried to speak with her. Smith could not answer basic questions regarding where she was going, what she was doing and she claimed she was in Point Pleasant. Smith could not form sentences, was speaking slow and whispering as she attempted to answer my questions. I asked if Smith needed and ambulance or any medical attention to which she replied, "no".

During my investigation Smith was able to relay she was a recovering alcoholic who relapsed and she was having issues with her mother. I observed a scratch on her face and inquired how that occurred and Smith advised it was caused by her mother while in Lakewood this morning. Smith struggled to relay any more information regarding the incident with her mother and I proceeded to request if Smith was able to perform some field sobriety tests. I inquired if Smith could read and write the English language to which she replied, "yes". I inquired if Smith knew the alphabet which she replied, "yes". I instructed Smith to recite the alphabet starting from the letter "B" and end with the letter "O". I asked Smith is she understood my instructions and she replied, "yes". I instructed Smith to begin when ready and she stated the following "B,O,C,D,E,F,G,H,K,P,Q,R and continued until the end of the alphabet. I inquired if Smith had any physical aliments which would prohibit her from performing several basic balance tests which she replied, "no".

I instructed Smith to exit her vehicle and she struggled to move her legs into position to exit the vehicle. Smith used both hands to brace herself to exit and pulled herself out of the vehicle. Smith swayed back and forth while exiting and used the car to hold herself up. Smith stepped out of the vehicle, continued to sway back and forth while stumbling as she tried to keep herself standing. I instructed Smith to walk to the front of her vehicle and she stumbled as she tried to turn around. Smith continued to struggle just to stand and I determined it was unsafe for her to perform any tests or to allow her to walk unassisted. At this time Smith was taken into Police custody and handcuffed without incident. Once Smith was taken into custody she required assistance with walking and balancing as we headed to my patrol vehicle. I checked the rear of my patrol vehicle which was clear of any items and Smith was searched then placed in the rear of my patrol vehicle.

I requested Police dispatch start a tow truck to my location to impound Smith's vehicle as per Johns law. At Smith's request I retrieved her cell phone from her vehicle and Ptl. Melia remained on scene for the tow truck. I transported Smith to Police headquarters without incident where she was processed, photographed and given an opportunity to provide breath sample for testing. While in the booking room Smith began to explain the assault which occurred with her mother. Smith relayed an argument occurred with her mother after she showered and her mother scratched her in the face. Smith advised her mother was caring for her daughter and she did not feel comfortable with that arrangement. I made contact with Lakewood Police and requested a welfare check at Smith's residence to address the concerns regarding her daughter.

Sgt. Feeney #200 responded to Police headquarters to operate the Alco-test machine. Prior to Smith's processing my duty weapon was secured in a lock box and prior to Alco-test operation all electronics were removed from the booking room. Sgt. Feeney advised Smith of her Miranda rights and she relayed she was willing to provide breath samples (see Sgt. Feeney's supplement report). Smith was unable to provide an adequate breath sample and the testing was terminated after six attempts. Smith was searched and placed in a jail cell while paperwork was completed. Smith was checked on every fifteen minutes due her intoxication with no issues.

Lakewood Police made contact with Smith's mother at her residence and it was determined an assault had occurred earlier in the day which left Smith's mother with a complaint of pain and a visible sign of injury. Lakewood Police responded to Police headquarters and took Smith into custody after she was released with her motor vehicle summonses. A limited liability form was completed with Lakewood Police assuming liability of Smith.

Smith's vehicle was impounded as per John's law and entered into property via Aegis. I searched the rear of my patrol vehicle which was free of any items. My body warn camera was on during the incident.

OfficerID: mfeeney, Narrative

On 01/08/18 at 1834 hours Ptl. Albanese #257 arrested Jessica Smith for DUI. Ptl. Albanese transported Smith to headquarters, where she was secured in the booking room.

I assisted Ptl. Albanese by operating the Alcotest 7110. Before starting my 20 minute observation in the booking room, I had Smith open her mouth, during which time I visually confirmed there were no foreign objects or debris in her mouth. I began my 20 minute observation of Smith and activated my body worn camera to record the observation.

I advised Smith of her Miranda Rights. Smith stated she understood and signed the Waiver portion of the form, which was witnessed by myself and Ptl. Albanese. I then read Smith the NJ Attorney General's Standard Statement for Motor Vehicle Operators. When asked if she would provide samples of her breath for testing, Smith responded "Yes".

During the 20 minute observation period Smith did not place any foreign objects in her mouth or regurgitate. After the 20 minute observation period I deactivated my body worn camera and it was removed from the room. It should be noted that all other portable electronic devices were removed from the booking room prior to activating the Alcotest, including cell phones, the laptop computer and portable radios.

After the 20 minute observation period I activated the Alcotest and entered Smith's information into the machine. I advised Smith of the posted instructions for providing breath samples, which she stated she understood. I then placed a new mouthpiece on the machine (from a sealed bag) and Smith attempted to provide a breath sample.

Smith attempted to provide a breath sample six times with negative results. Each attempt caused a "Min. Vol. Not Achieved" error message. After the sixth attempt I terminated the test. It should be noted that for each test I provided a new mouthpiece from a sealed bag for Smith to use. I also explained, in detail, how to provide a breath sample prior to each breath collection attempt and during each attempt. Despite my instructions prior to and during the breath sample collection, Smith would not provide an adequate breath sample.

## OfficerID: jalbanese, Narrative

On 1/11/19 at 2342 hours I was traveling on Chambers Bridge Rd. in the area of Oak Tree Ave. when I observed a Hyundai Sonata (NJ # M55ETT) traveling with a rear brake light out. I followed the Hyundai on Chambers Bridge Rd. and paced the vehicle at 55 MPH which is in excess of the 40 MPH speed limit. I observed the Hyundai fail to maintain its lane as it began to travel in the center of two lanes then move back into the left lane of travel.

I conducted a motor vehicle stop on the Hyundai on Chambers Bridge Rd. just West of Oak Tree Ave. I requested the driver provide his license, registration and insurance card which he provided. I identified the driver as John Mcdonnell and he was advised of the violation. I observed Mcdonnell's eyes to be glassy and could detect the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from his person. I inquired where Mcdonnell was coming from and how much he had to drink to which her replied, Applebees and two beers. At this time I requested Mcdonnell perform a test to gauge his level of intoxication which he agreed to take. I inquired if Mcdonnell could read and write the English language to which he replied, "yes". I inquired if Mcdonnell knew the alphabet and if he could recite it to which he replied, "yes". I instructed Mcdonnell to recite the alphabet starting with the letter "B" and ending with the letter "O". I inquired if Mcdonnell understood my instruction to which he replied, "yes". I instructed Mcdonnell he may begin the test when ready. Mcdonnell completed the test as follows: "B", "C", "D" then he took a brief pause and continued with "E", "F", "G", "H", "I", "K", "L", "N", "O", "P".

Ptl. Gannio #234 arrived on scene and I requested Mcdonnell exit the vehicle to perform some field sobriety tests. I inquired if Mcdonnell had any physical aliments that would prohibit him from performing balance tests to which he replied, "no". I advised Mcdonnell to stand with his feet together and arms at his sides while I explained the first test, the one leg stand. I explained to Mcdonnell he was to pick a leg of his choice and raise his foot six inches off the ground. Mcdonnell was instructed while with his foot six inches off the ground he was to keep his arms at his side and count aloud while looking at his raised foot, one thousand one, one thousand two, one thousand three and on until instructed to stop. I demonstrated the test to Mcdonnell and he advised he understood my instructions. Mcdonnell began the test as instructed and dropped his foot at one thousand two. Mcdonnell was advised to continue and proceeded as instructed which he did until he dropped his foot at one thousand nine. Mcdonnell continued and dropped his foot at one thousand fifteen and then once again at one thousand sixteen at which time I terminated the test.

The next test I explained to Mcdonnell was the walk and turn test. I instructed Mcdonnell to stand with his arms at his side with his right foot in front of his left foot as I explained the instructions. I instructed Mcdonnell to take nine steps forward heel to toe, then take a series of small steps to turn around and then take nine steps heel to toe back. I instructed Mcdonnell to count his steps aloud and to keep his arms at his side while performing the test. I demonstrated the test to Mcdonnell and advised him to begin when ready. Mcdonnell stated he understood my instruction and began the test counting nine steps forward with nine steps back. Mcdonnell could not keep his feet heel to toe on any steps allowing a gap on each step.

Mcdonnell was subsequently handcuffed, searched and arrested for suspicion of DUI. I requested a tow truck to impound Mcdonnell's vehicle as per John's law. Ptl. Gannio remained on scene for the tow truck and I transported Mcdonnell to Police headquarters. I checked my patrol vehicle before and after transporting Mcdonnell to Police headquarters which checked negative for any items. I transported Mcdonnell to Police headquarters where I secured my weapon in a lox box and then processed and photographed Mcdonnell. Ptl. Alexander #216 responded to Police headquarters to operate the alcho-test machine and all electronics were removed from the booking room prior to the test being conducted. Ptl. Alexander advised Mcdonnell of his Miranda rights and requested he provide breath sample for testing which he agreed to do (see Ptl. Alexander's supplemental report). Mcdonnell provided breath samples as instructed and had BAC of .13%. Mcdonnell was escorted to jail cell #1 where he was searched and lodged until his release. Fifteen minute checks were conducted on Mcdonnell due to his level of intoxication with no issues.

Mcdonnell's sister responded to Police headquarters, completed a potential liability form, assumed liability for Mcdonnell and he was released with a pending court date. Mcdonnell's vehicle was entered into property as impounded via Aegis. My body worn camera was activated during my investigation.

## OfficerID: malexander, Narrative

On 01-11-2019 at approximately 0000 hours I (Patrolman Alexander #216) was dispatched to Brick Police Headquarters (401 Chambers Bridge Road) to assist Patrolman Albanese #257 with a DWI arrest he made. Patrolman Albanese arrested a John McDonnell, and I was to operate The Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C.

Upon arrival I met with John McDonnell in the booking room. I first checked the inside of McDonnell's mouth for any foreign objects or residual alcohol, which was negative. I then read McDonnell his Miranda Rights and The Attorney General's Statement Form for Motor Vehicle Operators. McDonnell stated he understood his rights and would provide samples of his breath. Prior to administering the test all portable radios and any electronics that would interfere with the test were removed from the booking room. McDonnell was observed in excess of twenty minutes prior to the test, which at no time did he belch or regurgitate.

After the test was administered McDonnell had a reported breath test result of 0.13% BAC. The results were checked utilizing the State of New Jersey Alcotest Calculator, which were found to be within acceptable tolerance.

## OfficerID: pcatalina, Narrative

On 01/13/18 at 0018 hours, while working a supplemental Driving While Intoxicated patrol in marked vehicle 81, I responded to Ptl. DeLuca's #276 motor vehicle stop at his request.

Upon arrival I was met by Ptl. Deluca who stated the driver of the vehicle he had stopped admitted to consuming alcoholic beverages prior to operating her vehicle and that he could detect the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from the vehicle. The temperature was around 30 degrees and there was no wind.

I approached the driver's side of the vehicle and spoke with the driver, identified as Karli Miele through her New Jersey digital driver's license. As I spoke with Miele, I could smell the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from her vehicle. I asked Miele if she would exit her vehicle so I could speak with her further. Miele exited her vehicle and walked to the rear of it.

I noticed Miele's eyes were bloodshot and watery and her speech was slurred. I asked Miele to estimate the time and she said it was around 0030 hours, which was accurate. I asked Miele what her highest level of education was and she said college.

I asked Miele if she is familiar with the English language along with the English alphabet and she stated she was. I asked Miele to recite the alphabet from the letter "A" to the letter "Z" without singing or grouping the letters together. I explained and demonstrated the test to Miele by saying the letters A,B,C,D, slowly and individually without singing or grouping them together. I asked Miele if she understood which she stated she did. I asked Miele if she had any questions and she stated she did not. Miele was instructed to begin. Miele started to group the letters together at the end of the alphabet. Due to the performance on the test, I asked Miele to perform the Standardized Field Sobriety Tests.

The first test I conducted was the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test. I put Miele into the starting position by having her feet together and her hands at her sides. I told her I was going to check her eyes. I instructed Miele to keep her head still and to follow my pen with her eyes only and not to move her head. I asked Miele if she understood and she stated he did. Prior to conducting the test I checked Miele's eyes for resting nystagmus which she did not have and I ensured Miele's eyes tracked equally, which they did. After testing Miele's eyes, I observed both eyes to have a lack of smooth pursuit, both eyes have nystagmus at maximum deviation for a period of no less than four seconds along with the her left eye having the onset of nystagmus prior to 45 degrees for a period of no less than four seconds. As I was testing Miele's eyes, I could smell the odor of an alcoholic beverage on her breath. Due to Miele's performance on the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test, I asked her to perform the Walk and Turn Test.

The following tests were performed on the dry, debris free, level surface located at 335 Drum Point Road (Drum Point Plaza). Prior to test, I asked Miele if she had any injuries affecting her now and she responded "No."

I attempted to put Miele into the starting position for the Walk and Turn test by having her put her right foot in front of her left while utilizing the yellow fire lane line as a guide. I instructed Miele to keep her hands at her sides during the entire test. As I was explaining and demonstrating the test, Miele could not maintain the starting position. I told Miele I was going to give her a series of instructions and to not to start the test until I told her to. I asked Miele if she understood and she stated she did. I told Miele, when I instruct her to begin, walk nine steps forward, touching heel to toe counting her steps out loud with her hands at her sides. I told Miele on her ninth step to turn around by pivoting on her lead foot while taking several small steps to her left and walk nine steps in the direction she just came from while touching heel to toe and counting her steps out loud. Prior to instructing Miele to begin the test, I reminded her that once she starts the test to look at her feet, count her steps out loud, keep her hands at her sides and once she starts the test not to stop it until she has completed it. I asked Miele if she understood the test and she stated she did. Miele was instructed to begin. Miele stopped to steady herself, walked off the line and did not touch heel to toe. At the end of the test, I asked Miele if she injured herself and she said "no," I asked Miele if she should perform one additional test and she stated she would, The next test I explained and demonstrated for Miele was the One-Leg Stand test. I put Miele into the starting position by having her put her feet together and keeping her hands at her sides. I advised Miele I was going to give her a series of instructions and to not begin the test until I instruct her to do so. I asked Miele if she understood and she stated she did. I told Miele, when I tell her to, I want her to raise one leg, either leg, approximately six inches off of the ground, with her foot pointed out and parallel with the ground. I instructed Miele with her foot raised to keep both legs straight and to keep her eyes on the elevated foot. I told Miele while holding her foot out to count out loud up from one one-thousand until I tell her to stop. I asked Miele if she understood and she stated he did. Miele was instructed to begin the test. Miele raised her foot and it was not six inches off the ground. Miele put her foot down when I instructed her to raise it further and held the position for the 30 seconds that I timed on my watch.

Due to Miele's admission to consuming alcoholic beverages prior to operating her vehicle, coupled with the performance on the standardized field sobriety tests, I concluded Miele was operating her vehicle under the influence of an intoxicating liquor. Ptl. DeLuca took Miele into custody and transported her to Headquarters for processing. I remained on scene and Miele's vehicle was impounded as per John's Law by Andrew's Auto body. Miele's passenger was picked up by a friend.

Once at Headquarters, Miele was provided her Miranda Warnings by Ptl. Catalina #263, which she waived and replied "yes" to the standard statement, which he also read to her. Ptl. Catalina observed Miele for an uninterrupted period of no less than 20 minutes and then operated the Alcotest machine (see supplemental report by Ptl. Catalina, same case number). After operating the Alcotest machine, Ptl. Catalina advised me Miele's blood alcohol concentration was measured at 0.08 percent. The results were provided to dispatch, who confirmed the breath samples were within acceptable tolerance through the New Jersey State Police Alcotest Calculator.

Miele was processed and charged with Driving While Intoxicated (1506 E 19 120), Reckless Driving (1506 E 19 119) and Careless Driving (1506 E 19 118). Miele's was turned over to her boyfriend, who signed the Potential Liability Form acknowledging receipt.

## OfficerID: jdeluca, Narrative

On 01/13/2019 at approximately 0015 hours, while in the area of Bay Harbor Plaza I observed a silver KIA traveling north on Brick Boulevard. The vehicle in question was traveling at a high rate of speed and believed to be traveling in excess of the posted speed limit of 50 miles per hour.

Due to my observations, I attempted to pace the vehicle in question. While traveling at a rate of 62 miles per hour in marked patrol vehicle #32, I was unable to close the distance of the suspect vehicle. Due to the vehicle traveling at a high rate of speed, I closed the distance on the suspect vehicle, and was able to observe the registration on the vehicle, NJREG#U97KHR. Dispatch was then advised I would be conducting a motor vehicle stop on the suspect vehicle and the vehicle was ultimately stopped in the parking lot of Drum Point Plaza.

I then exited my vehicle and made a passenger side approach on the suspect vehicle. Once at the vehicle I observed two occupants, a female driver, and a unknown male passenger. I identified myself to the driver and requested her credentials, drivers license, registration, and proof of insurance. The driver was able to provide the requested documents and identified as Karli Miele. Upon identifying the driver, I advised her of the reason for the motor vehicle stop.

It should be noted while speaking with Ms. Miele, I detected the odor of alcoholic beverages emanating from the interior of the vehicle. It was at this time I asked Ms. Miele where she was traveling from and she advised bowling. I then asked her if she had consumed alcoholic beverages and she stated one drink. Due to my observations, admission from Ms. Miele of consuming alcoholic beverages, and suspicions of her operating under the influence of alcoholic beverages, I requested Sgt. Catalina #229 respond to the scene for field sobriety testing who was working an over the limit under arrest detail.

Sgt. Catalina #229 and Ptl. Mancini #282 responded to the scene. Upon arrival of these officers, Ms. Miele was requested to exit the vehicle and field sobriety testing was later performed by Sgt. Catalina. (see his case report under this case number)

Upon completion of field sobriety testing, Ms. Miele was believed to be operating a motor vehicle under the influence of alcoholic beverages, a violation of NJ 39:4-50 and placed under arrest. I then transported her to Brick Township Police headquarters for further testing. Upon arrival to headquarters, I opened the door of the rear passenger compartment where Ms. Miele was seated, and detected a strong odor of alcoholic beverages emanating from the vehicle.

Once at headquarters, Ptl. Catalina #263 was requested to respond for operation of the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C. (see his supplemental report under this case number, as well as Sgt. Catalina's case for further.)

## OfficerID: Mcatalina, Narrative

On 01/13/2019 I responded to Police Headquarters to operate the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C in reference to Karli N. Miele (Miele) who was in custody for DUI (See Case Report by Sgt. Catalina #229).

On arrival, Miele was escorted to the booking room. Miele was under my direct uninterrupted observation for twenty minutes. During the observation period, Miele did not have anything in her mouth, did not belch or vomit and did not consume any food or drinks. Miele had a cough during the observation period due to her being sick. All portable electronic devices were removed from the booking room. I advised Miele of her Miranda Warnings at 0104 hours. Miele agreed to the acknowledgement of her Miranda Rights and also signed off on the Miranda Warning Form at 0107 hours.

I read The NJ Attorney General's Standard Statement for Motor Vehicle Operators to Miele. After completing the nine bullets, Miele stated, "Yes" when asked if she would submit samples of her breath. I operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C. Miele was read the breath sample instructions verbatim, from the posted sign, which she stated she understood. The instructions were read for both breath sample collections.

The breath hose mouth pieces were changed after each breath sample was given. The reported breath samples recorded was 0.08% BAC. The breath sample results were entered into the New Jersey State Police Alcotest Calculator, and were within acceptable tolerances.

A copy of the Alcohol Influence Report was provided to Miele upon her release.

## OfficerID: coliverio, Narrative

On 1/18/2019 at 0048 hours, I Ptl. Oliverio was dispatched to a motor vehicle complaint in the area of Rt. 70 and Rt. 88. Dispatch advised a third party caller stated they just witnessed a white jeep crash near the area of 856 RT. 70 (7-11). The suspect vehicle then fled the area westbound on RT.70. While en route to the area I observed a White Jeep with front end damage to the passenger side light, traveling east in the area of 2747 Hooper Ave. I turned around and positioned myself behind the vehicle at the intersection of Mantoloking Rd and Hooper Ave. I observed the White Jeep bearing NJ Reg D47GSR travel through the intersection and into the opposite lane of travel. At this time I conducted a traffic stop in the area of Hooper Ave and Beacon Ave.

I made a driver side approach and was met by the driver (later identified has Danielle Faul), I asked Faul for her driving credentials, (I. E Driver license, registration, and insurance card). Faul's hand movements were slow, her eyes were bloodshot and watery and I detected the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from the passenger compartment of the vehicle. Faul was only able to produce her driver's license. I asked Faul if she had been involved in a crash to which she replied no. I ask where she was coming from and she replied Beacon 70. Sgt. Dierking #204 arrived on scene to assist.

I asked Faul to step out of the vehicle in order for her to view the damage to her vehicle. Her passenger side light was pushed in and her tire was blown out causing her to drive on the rim of the vehicle. I asked her if that damage had always been there to which she stated, yes my light never worked and air was low in my tire. While outside the vehicle and speaking with Faul I detected the odor of an alcoholic beverage on her person and from her breath.

At this time I informed Faul I believed that she was operating her vehicle while under the influence of an alcoholic beverage and I informed her I would like to perform tests to determine if she was. Faul agreed to perform the tests.

When asked if she had any medical conditions which would prohibit and/or affect her ability to the taking of the field sobriety tests, Faul stated no. The field sobriety test/examinations were conducted in a well-lit, flat area free from any type of large cracks or debris. I asked Faul what was her highest level of education, she stated Bachelor's Degree. I asked Faul if she was well versed in the English language she stated yes.

The first examination conducted was to recite the alphabet. While explaining, and demonstrating the test I observed Faul in the starting position. Once I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Faul had no questions and was instructed to begin. Faul performed the test without incident.

The second examination conducted was the One-Leg-Stand test. While explaining and demonstrating the test I observed Faul in the starting position, she came out of the starting position and raised her hands for balance multiple times. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Faul had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the test Faul raised her right foot approximately three (3) inches, counted 1, 2, 3 and put her foot down. She then raised her right foot three (3) inches again and counted 4, 5. She then raised her right foot again and counted till 12 before putting her foot down again. I asked Faul if she wanted to attempt the test again which she replied "Yes". She then proceeded to put her hands behind her back and did not attempt the test again.

The final examination conducted was the Walk and Turn. While explaining and demonstrating the test, I observed Faul in the starting position she came out of the starting position and started the test before being instructed to do so. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Faul had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the test Faul took five (5) steps then asked how many steps she need to take. I informed her to take a total of nine (9) steps. She proceeded to take a total of thirteen (13) steps none being heal to toe. Faul then turned around and took nine (9) steps back all without touching heal to toe.

Due to the traffic violations I observed, the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from Faul's breath, and her failure to pass the psychophysical tests I placed her under arrest (Handcuffs double locked). Faul was transported to H.Q. by me without incident. Ptl. Hentges #288 remained at the scene and awaited D&L Towing Co. to respond and impound the vehicle under John's Law.

Ptl. Bennett #279 responded to H.Q., and operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine (See Ptl. Bennett #279 supplemental report for further information). Prior to the Alcotest being administered the room was cleared of any unauthorized electronic devices (i.e., portable radios, cellular phones, etc.). During the twenty (20) minute observation period Faul became argumentative with Ptl. Bennett #279 and asked several times why we were removing our body cameras once the Alcotest was activated. At the conclusion of the Alcotest Ptl. Bennett #279 advised me, the Alcotest unit displayed a control test failure at the end of its checks and required a solution change.

Ptl. Bennett #279 and I then responded to Point Pleasant Boro Police Department .While At PPPD, Faul stated
When I attempted to escort Faul back to the venicie,

she stated she was fine she just wants to comply. At the conclusion of the Alcotest Ptl. Bennett #279 advised me, the Alcotest unit displayed a control test failure at the end of its checks and required a solution change.

We then transported Faul to Lakewood Police Department. While at LPD Ptl. Bennett #279 informed me, Faul provided acceptable breath samples. Her blood alcohol content was determined to be 0.12%BAC. While at LPD, Faul became argumentative again stating the processes was taking too long, and that her taxes pay for these machines to work.

Faul was released a short time later to a family member/friend, form.

, who signed and was given a copy of the strict liability

I issued Faul the following summonses: 1506-E19-000172 Driving under the influence 1506-E19-000177 failure to exhibit registration 1506-E19-000173 Reckless driving 1506-E19-000175 unsafe lane change 1506-E19-000176 failure to exhibit insurance

Ptl. Hentges completed a crash report related to this incident under the same Case #.

## OfficerID: mbennett, Narrative

On 01/18/2019 I assisted Ptl. Oliverio #286 in acting as Alcotest operator for his DWI arrest of Danielle M. Faul. Faul was secured in the DWI processing room by Ptl. Oliverio. Prior to entering the room, I removed my portable police radio and cellular phone and secured them in another room. I then entered the processing room with my body camera and made contact with Faul. I visually inspected the interior of Faul's mouth and confirmed that there were no foreign objects inside (i.e. gum, breath mints, etc.). I then began the twenty minute observation period at 0153hrs. At 0213hrs, I deactivated my body camera and removed it from the room. I then began entering the required information into the Alcotest unit. After obtaining two acceptable breath samples from Faul, the Alcotest unit displayed a Control Test failure at the end of it's checks and required a solution change. Ptl. Oliverio and I then transported Faul to Point Pleasant Boro to utilize their machine.

Upon arrival at Point Pleasant PD, we escorted Faul inside and secured her in the DWI processing room. After again visually inspecting the interior of her mouth with negative results, I conducted another twenty minute observation period of Faul at 0311hrs. At 0331hrs, Ptl. Oliverio and I deactivated our body cameras and he secured both back in our patrol vehicles while I entered the required information into the Alcotest unit. I obtained two acceptable breath samples from Faul in four attempts. At the end of the test, however, their Alcotest unit also displayed a Control Test fail. At this time, Ptl. Oliverio and I transported Faul to Lakewood PD to utilize their machine.

Upon arrival at Lakewood PD, we removed our portable police radios and cellular phones and secured them in the patrol vehicle. We then escorted Faul inside and placed her in the processing room where I again visually inspected the interior of her mouth with negative results and conducted a third twenty minute observation period at 0419hrs. At 0439hrs, we deactivated our body cameras and removed them from our person. I then entered the DWI processing room where the Alcotest unit was located and entered all required information into the unit. I then obtained two acceptable breath samples from Faul. Her blood alcohol content was determined to be 0.12%BAC. Faul was then transported back to Brick PD where she was later served with her summonses and released to the custody of her husband. I provided dispatch with the Alcotest results from Lakewood and they entered the information into the Alcotest Calculator. The readings were found to be within the allowable tolerances. See Ptl. Oliverio's case narrative for further details.

## OfficerID: jdeluca, Narrative

On 01/21/2019 at approximately 1939 hours, Ptl. Barlowski #284 and I responded to the area of Old Navy in reference to a hit and run motor vehicle accident that was reported to have occurred in the area of Panera Bread, later identified as Atlanta Bread.

While responding to the scene, dispatch advised a burgundy Chrysler 200 bearing MDREG#8AY8253 was the suspect vehicle and was actively being followed by the caller. The caller advised dispatch he followed the vehicle from the scene of the accident, on to the Garden State Parkway north bound to exit 90. He advised at exit 90 the vehicle exited the parkway and he continued to follow the vehicle on to Chambers Bridge Road near the post office. The caller later advised he continued to follow the vehicle until it came to a stop in the parking lot of Kohl's shopping center near Old Navy. The caller also advised the operator of the vehicle appeared to be a female driver.

Upon arrival to the scene, I observed the suspect vehicle, with a blond female standing near the passenger side of her vehicle and near a silver colored Subaru Crosstrek bearing NJREG#P66JGV, later identified as the suspect's boyfriend, and a white Nissan Altima bearing NJREG#V89ESG, later identified as the witness.

As I approached the suspect vehicle, I asked the blonde female, later identified as Anna Wagner, if the vehicle was hers and she advised that it was.

It was at this time Ptl. Barlowski arrived on scene and, I requested he remain with the suspect while I receive a statement from witness, identified as . statement was consistent with the information provided to dispatch with the exception of the location of the motor vehicle accident. The location of the accident was identified on Cedar Bridge Avenue west bound in the area of Brick Boulevard and he advised that the suspect had struck a sign.

After I spoke with . , I approached the suspect, later identified as Anna Wagner. As I approached Ms. Wagner, I immediately detected the odor of alcoholic beverages emanating from her breath. I asked where she was coming from and she advised Rosalita's. I asked if she had consumed alcoholic beverages and she stated two. I asked two what and she stated margaritas. I asked how long ago she consumed the beverages and she stated two hours ago. I asked if she had consumed any food while she was at the establishment and she stated empanadas.

Ms. Wagner was then asked if she had any idea she was involved in a motor vehicle accident and she stated no she did not.

It should be noted Ptl. Barlowski asked Ms. Wagner earlier if she was aware of any substantial damage to her vehicle and she stated that she was not.

It was at this time I believed Ms. Wagner to be operating under the influence of alcoholic beverages and begun to perform Standardized Field Sobriety Testing. The first test explained was the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus Test, commonly referred to as HGN. Ms. Wagner was asked to stand with her feet together and hands at her side and she proceeded to place her hands straight out to her side at a 90 degree angle to her body. While standing in this position, Ms. Wagner failed to maintain her balance and stumbled. Due to wind conditions, I was unable to perform this test at this location due to Ms. Wagner's hair obstructing my vision of her eyes.

Ms. Wagner was then escorted to the area of the Kirkland Store to continue testing. Once in this area, the test was explained again and administered. Ms. Wagner had a lack of smooth pursuit in both her left and right eyes, nystagmus in both of her eyes at maximum deviation, and onset of nystagmus in both of her eyes prior to 45 degrees.

The second test explained Walk and Turn Test. Prior to administering this test, Ms. Wagner was asked if she had any medical conditions that would prevent her from walking properly and she advised she did not. Upon the completion of the explanation of this test, the test was administered. Ms. Wagner failed to keep her balance while listening to instruction, stopped walking to steady herself, failed to touch heel to toe, turned incorrectly, used her arms for balance, and did not take the correct number of steps. It should be noted while turning, Ms. Wagner turned 90 degrees and walked towards me as opposed to traveling back the same path that she had begun from as explained.

The third test, the One Leg Stand, was not fully explained and was not administered due to concern of Ms. Wagner's safety of almost falling over after completing the walk and turn.

It should be noted all tests were performed in a well lit area, free of any large cracks and or debris.

It was at this time Ms. Wagner was placed under arrest for suspicion of operating a motor vehicle under the influence of alcohol. She was handcuffed behind her back, double-locked, searched and placed in the rear of marked patrol vehicle #32. She was then transported to Brick Township Police headquarters.

While transporting Ms. Wagner to police headquarters, Ptl. Barlowski remained on scene until Glenn's towing responded to remove her vehicle from the scene in accordance with John's Law. A NJTR-1 was also completed by Ptl. Barlowski in reference to the motor vehicle crash. (see his NJTR-1 report under this case number).

While at headquarters, Ms. Wagner was requested to provide a breath sample on Alcotest 7110MKIII-C. The Alcotest 7110MKIII-C was operated by Ptl. Haugh #217. (see his supplemental report under this case number).

Upon completion of this, Ptl. Haugh advised Ms. Wagner provided samples were within an acceptable tolerance and indicated a result of 0.16% BAC.

Ms. Wagner received several motor vehicle summons' operating under the influence of alcohol 39:4-50 on summons#1506-E19-000221, reckless driving 39:4-96 on summons#1506-E19-000222, and Careless driving 39:4-97A on summons#1506-E19-000223. In addition the motor vehicle summons' issued by myself, Ms. Wagner received two additional summons' from Ptl. Barlowski, 39:4-129B leaving the scene of an accident 39:4-129B on summons#1506-E19-000224 and failure to report an accident 39:4-130 on summons#1506-E19-000225.

Ms. Wagner's boyfriend, ultimately responded to headquarters. Upon his arrival he was explained the Potential Liability Waiver by Ptl. Haugh #217. He accepted this liability and Ms. Wagner was released to him.

Ms. Wagner's vehicle was entered into Aegis as an impounded vehicle.

The State of NJ Driving While Impaired form was faxed to the NJ State Police.

## OfficerID: ehaugh, Narrative

On 01-21-2019 at 2011hrs. I was dispatched to Police Headquarters to operate the Alcotest 7110MKIII-C. I met the arresting officer and the arrestee (Anna Wagner) in front of Police Headquarters as they arrived.

While inside I observed Wagner in excess of twenty minutes. Wagner was advised of her rights and signed the form that she understood. I read the NJ Standard Statement Form and she advised me she would provide breath samples. Prior to beginning the test I requested all radios and electronic devises be removed from the room and they were. Wagner provided two samples with a result of 0.16% BAC. The results were ran through he State of New Jersey Alcotest Calculator and the breath samples were within acceptable tolerance.

## OfficerID: tcaulfield, Narrative

On 01/26/2019 at approximately 0701 hours, I, Ptl. Caulfield #235 was traveling on Lanes Mill Road in the area of the GSP entrance. At that time, I observed a 2007 Chevrolet Impala, bearing NJ registration C35KAF, traveling north on Lanes Mill Road. The vehicle had tint affixed to the front driver and passenger side windows and I also observed objects hanging from the vehicle's rear view mirror (Obstructed view). I then began traveling directly behind the vehicle as it traveled north on Lanes Mill Road towards Primrose Lane. As the vehicle was passing Lanes Mill Elementary School, the vehicle's front passenger side tires drifted to the right, crossed over the white shoulder fog line, and began traveling in both the lane of travel and the shoulder lane. The vehicle then slowly drifted back to the left and proceeded north on Lanes Mill Road towards Sally Ike Road.

When the vehicle crossed over Sally Ike Road, the vehicle again drifted to the right, crossed over the white fog line, and began traveling in the shoulder lane on Lanes Mill Road. After traveling in shoulder lane, the vehicle quickly swerved to the left and began traveling back into the lane of travel. At that time, I activated my patrol vehicle's emergency lights and the vehicle pulled over into the shoulder in the area in front of Brick Memorial High School.

Upon the vehicle stopping in the shoulder, I exited my patrol vehicle, approached the front passenger side window, identified myself to the driver, advised her as to why I had stopped her, and requested that the driver exhibit her driving credentials. As the driver, identified as Candace M. Haynes, was retrieving said driving documents, I immediately detected an odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from the cabin of the vehicle. The odor of the alcoholic beverage was heavily masked by a very strong odor of a body spray type perfume. In addition, I observed Haynes's hand movements were slow and fumbling, her eyes were watery, bloodshot, and her eyelids were heavy and droopy. Haynes stated she had failed to maintain her lane because she was attempting to pull a weave hairpiece from her head causing her vehicle to drift out of her lane of travel. As I continued speaking with Haynes, I observed her speech was slow and slurred. Haynes handed me her NJ driver's license but was unable to locate the vehicle's registration and insurance card. Ptl. Rotondo #252 arrived on scene moments later. When asked if she had consumed any alcoholic beverages, Haynes claimed that she had two (2) vodka drinks last night, 01/25/2019, in Neptune, NJ.

At that time, I had Haynes exit the vehicle in order to administer field sobriety tests in which he, Haynes, had no objection to. As Haynes was exiting her vehicle and walking towards the sidewalk area near the rear of her vehicle, I observed her swaying and slightly staggering while walking. While Haynes was standing on the sidewalk, I also observed that she was swaying while standing and her stance was very rigid. In addition, a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage was emanating from Haynes's breath while speaking to her outside her vehicle. When asked if she had any medical conditions which would prohibit and/or effect her ability to the taking of the field sobriety tests/examinations, Haynes stated no. The field sobriety tests/examinations were conducted in a well lit, flat area, free from any type of large cracks and/or debris.

The first examination administered was the Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus test. After explaining to Haynes as to how to perform the examination, Haynes had no questions at which time I administered the examination. While administering the test, Haynes repeatedly kept moving her head and was also not following the stimulus. I had to instruct her multiple times to keep her head still, and to follow the stimulus with her eyes only. In addition, Haynes also failed to keep her feet together and arms at her side throughout the examination. Due to Haynes not following the directions of the examination, I had to administer the test multiple times in order to gauge a proper and correct assessment of the evaluation. While administering the test, I observed lack of smooth pursuit in both eyes, distinct and sustained nystagmus at maximum deviation in both eyes, and an onset of nystagmus prior to 45 degrees in both eyes. The next examination conducted was the Walk and Turn test. While explaining and demonstrating the test, Haynes swayed while standing in the starting position had some difficulty maintaining her balance while in the starting position. Haynes repeatedly kept stepping off the line with her right and left foot and she also kept interrupting and talking over me while I was explaining and demonstrating the examination. Haynes also began the test before being instructed by me to begin. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Haynes had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the test, Haynes failed to touch heel to toe on every step, failed to count out loud on every step, and turned incorrectly (Failed to keep her lead foot on the ground). It should be noted that before Haynes started the test, she stated, "I couldn't even do this if I wasn't drinking." Furthermore, I had to explain and demonstrate the test multiple times and her ability to follow simple instructions was incredibly poor The final examination conducted was the One-Leg-Stand test. While explaining, and demonstrating, the test I observed that Haynes was swaying while standing in the starting position and also failed to keep her arms at her side as instructed. Haynes also started the examination before being told to begin. In addition, Haynes repeatedly kept interrupting and talking over me while I explaining and demonstrating the test. Once I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Haynes had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the examination, Haynes was swaying while her right foot was elevated, only had her right foot raised approximately 2-3 inches off the ground, and immediately placed her right foot on the ground after she counted "one-thousand-one". Haynes tried performing the test two more times but was unable to keep her right foot raised after counting "one-thousand-one". After the third attempt, Haynes stated she was unable to perform the test at which time the examination was stopped. Following the field sobriety tests/examinations, I advised Haynes she was under arrest at which point she began yelling, crying, and cursing. After Haynes was handcuffed (Handcuffs were double locked), she was verbally resistant and was refusing to get into the rear of my patrol vehicle. After several moments, Haynes got into the rear of my patrol vehicle however, she continued yelling, crying, and using profanity over the fact that she was under arrest. Haynes was then transported by me to Brick PD headquarters in patrol car #44 without incident. Ptl. Rotondo #252 remained on scene and waited for Lepore's Towing Co. to respond and impound the vehicle under John's Law.

Once at police headquarters, Haynes's defiant and disorderly behavior continued. She was yelling and cursing that she was under arrest and removed her hands from the prisoner handcuff belt on two occasions. Haynes was read her Miranda Rights and refused to sign off on the waiver portion of the form (Invoked her rights). In addition, I also inspected Haynes's oral cavity inside police headquarters which yielded negative results/findings. I then read Haynes the NJ D.U.I. Standard Statement form (Implied Consent) in which she agreed to submit samples of her breath. I operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine and also observed Haynes for twenty minutes (Twenty minutes were managed utilizing my personal wristwatch) prior to administering the test. During said observation time, Haynes remained under constant and uninterrupted observation until the administering of the Alcotest machine was fully complete. In addition, the Alcotest machine area was free from any type of electronic devices (i.e., portable radios, cellular telephones, etc.). Haynes provided sufficient breath samples and her BAC was 0.11%. I then entered the Alcotest breath sample results into the NJSP Alcotest Calculator in which the breath sample results were within acceptable tolerance. Furthermore, a new mouthpiece was used each time Haynes provided a breath sample into the Alcotest machine.

Haynes was processed, as per department policy, and issued motor vehicle summonses for 39:4-50 (1506-E19-272), 39:4-96 (1506-E19-273), 39:4-97 (1506-E19-274), 39:4-88B (1506-E19-275), 39:3-75 (1506-E19-276), 39:3-74 (1506-E19-277), 39:3-29B (1506-E19-278), 39:3-29C (1506-E19-279), and 39:4-50(G)(1) (1506-E19-280). Haynes was released a short time later to her brother, who signed and was given the original copy of the Potential Liability form. In addition, Haynes was given a copy of

the Alcohol Influence Report from the Alcotest machine.

## OfficerID: joseph.riccio, Narrative

On 01/27/2019 I (Ptl. Riccio #289) was conducting a DWI patrol. At 0020 hours I observed a red BMW X6 (N.J. Reg. D84HHC) stopped at the red traffic light in the left turn lane on Rt. 70 westbound near Brick Boulevard. When the traffic light turned green I observed the vehicle perform an improper U-turn and proceed eastbound on Rt. 70.

As I closed the distance on the vehicle I ran the license plate through the DMV database, and discovered the vehicle had not been registered since 12/2018. I stopped the vehicle on Rt. 70 eastbound just passed Chambers Bridge Road. I approached the vehicle and was met by the driver, Naim Williams. I asked Naim for his credentials (i.e. license, registration, and insurance) and he provided them willingly. While speaking with Naim I observed his eyes to be watery, his hand movements slow, and could detect the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from the passenger compartment of the vehicle. Ptl. Docherty arrived on scene to assist. Ptl. Docherty observed a half empty bottle of "D'usse" Cognac behind the front passenger seat of the vehicle. I asked Naim if he had anything to drink tonight to which he stated he had a few drinks at home, and some at the TGI Friday's restaurant.

I asked Naim to step out of the vehicle and he did so without incident. While outside of the vehicle I could detect the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from Naim's breathe. I advised Naim I would like to run him through field sobriety tests, and he advised he was willing to do them.

When asked if he had any medical conditions which would prohibit and/or affect his ability to the taking of the field sobriety tests, Naim stated "no". The field sobriety test/examinations were conducted in a well-lit, flat area free from any type of large cracks or debris. I asked Naim what was his highest level of education, he stated "some college".

The first examination conducted was to recite the alphabet. While explaining and demonstrating the test Naim started the test without being instructed to. Once I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Naim had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the test Naim began to sing portions of the alphabet which he was instructed not to do.

The second examination conducted was the One-Leg-Stand test. While explaining and demonstrating the test I observed Naim begin the test without being instructed to do so. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Naim had no questions and was instructed to begin. Naim lifted his right foot and asked me what he was supposed to do. I explained tested to Naim again and he was instructed to begin. While performing the test Naim lifted his left foot and began to count. While performing the test Naim failed to look down at his foot and dropped his foot at ten one-thousand. Naim lifted his left foot again and made it to fifteen one-thousand before dropping his foot again. The test was terminated.

The final examination conducted was the Walk and Turn. While explaining and demonstrating the test, I observed Naim in the starting position. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Naim had no questions and was instructed to begin. On the first nine steps Naim raised his arms for balance and did a total of ten steps. At the conclusion of the Nine steps he proceeded to do the next set of nine steps backwards raising his arms for balance. To give Naim the benefit of the doubt I explained and demonstrated the test again. At the conclusion of explaining Naim was instructed to begin. While performing the test Naim's body was swaying. He also failed to touch heel to toe on steps eight and nine. On the second set of nine steps Naim completed the without incident.

Due to the traffic violations I observed, the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from Naim's breath, and his failure to pass the psychophysical tests I placed him under arrest (Handcuffs double locked). While checking the interior of the vehicle for any alcoholic beverages I observed small pieces of green vegetation suspected to be marijuana. A probable cause search of the vehicle yielded negative results. Naim was transported to H.Q. by me without incident. Ptl. Albanese #257 remained at the scene and awaited Joe & Son's Towing Co. to respond and impound the vehicle under John's Law.

Ptl. Catalina #263 responded to H.Q., and operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine (See Ptl. Catalina's supplemental report for further information). Prior to the Alcotest being administered the room was cleared of any unauthorized electronic devices (i.e., portable radios, cellular phones, etc.). At the conclusion of the Alcotest Ptl. Catalina advised me, Naim refused to provide breath samples.

Naim was issued the following summonses:

Naim was released a short time later to a family friend who signed and was given a copy of the strict liability form.

** The vehicle that Naim was placed in, was checked prior to and after being placed in my patrol vehicle.

## OfficerID: Mcatalina, Narrative

On 01/27/2019 I responded to Police Headquarters to operate the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C in reference to Naim T. Williams (Williams) who was in custody for DUI (See Case Report by Ptl. Riccio #289).

On arrival, Williams was escorted to the booking room. Williams was under my direct uninterrupted observation for twenty minutes. During the observation period, Williams did not have anything in his mouth, did not belch or vomit and did not consume any food or drinks. All portable electronic devices were removed from the booking room. I advised Williams of his Miranda Warnings at 0114 hours. Williams agreed to the acknowledgement of his Miranda Rights and also signed off on the Miranda Warning Form at 0114 hours.

I read The NJ Attorney General's Standard Statement for Motor Vehicle Operators to Williams. After completing the nine bullets, Williams stated, "I'll take the test" when asked if he would submit samples of his breath. Approximately halfway through the twenty minute continuous observation, while being asked other questions to complete the DUI packet, Williams advised he would not submit breath samples. Due to Williams's statement, I then went back and read him the second paragraph on the NJ Attorney General's Standard Statement for Motor Vehicle Operations. Williams again advised he was not going to give samples of his breath. I operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C for a refusal.

A copy of the Alcohol Influence Report was provided to Williams upon his release.

## OfficerID: tstephenson, Narrative

On 01/30/2019 at 1804 hrs, I responded to the dead end of Burnt Tavern Road, the area of 82 Burnt Tavern Road, in reference to a single car crash. Dispatch advised that a subject had driven their car through the barrier at the end of Burnt Tavern Road.

Upon arrival, I observed a black Nissan Xtera approximately 20 yards off of the road. I approached the vehicle and observed a male driver, later identified as Kyle Velardi, slouched over in the front seat with his eyes closed. Velardi stated he was uninjured, but the vehicle was on an angle above a creek bed. Velardi gave me short answer's and continued to close his eyes when I asked if he was injured. I opened the door to the suspect vehicle, Velardi crawled over the passenger seat and exited. When he exited he was unable to maintain his balance and I could smell the odor of an alcoholic beverage on Velardi's breath. I contacted Dispatch and advised them to send Brick Police EMS to evaluate Velardi was unable to walk back to the roadway unassisted and continued to stumble. Velardi was seen by EMS and refused any further medical care. Ptl. Carter 280 arrived on scene to assist. Velardi was soaked, stated he exited the vehicle after he crashed and fell into the creek before he reentered the car. Due to the extremely cold weather, Velardi was allowed approximately 15 minutes to warm up in the back of Brick Police EMS ambulance. While he warmed up, he stated several times that he was fine, he was not even cold. Velardi and I then exited the ambulance to begin field sobriety tests.

When asked if he had any medical conditions which would prohibit and/or affect his ability to the taking of the field sobriety tests, Velardi stated no. The field sobriety test/examinations were conducted in a well-lit, flat area free from any type of large cracks or debris. I asked Velardi what was his/her highest level of education, he stated he graduated high school. I asked Velardi if he was well versed in the English language he stated he was.

The first examination conducted was the One-Leg-Stand test. While explaining and demonstrating the test I observed Velardi in the starting position where he swayed sided to side at his hips and was unable to stand with his arms at his sides. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Velardi had no questions and was instructed to begin. I observed Velardi in the starting position, he was unable to stand with his feet together after being told to do so several times. While performing the test, Velardi was unable to lift his foot off the ground and began to count with the heel of his right foot still pressed to the ground in attempt to maintain his balance. He was unable to maintain his balance and took his arms away from his sides to prevent from falling over. I terminated the test and again explained to him what he had to do. I asked Velardi if he would like to try the test again. Velardi agreed and attempted the test, he was next to the ambulance and placed his legs against it in an attempt to maintain his balance. He was told to step away from the ambulance and begin the test when he was ready. He put his left hand against the ambulance to prevent himself from falling. He began the test a third time, he did not keep his arms to his side, he did not count aloud, and he placed his hand against the ambulance to brace himself from falling. Velardi was unable to perform, and the test was terminated for his safety.

The second examination conducted was to recite the alphabet from A to Q. While explaining, and demonstrating the test I observed Velardi in the starting position. Once I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Velardi stated he had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the test Velardi slurred several times. While he recited, he went from the letter L, to the letter I. He held his arms out to the side to maintain his balance.

The final examination conducted was the Walk and Turn. While explaining and demonstrating the test, Velardi was unable to maintain the starting position, he had his feet canted out to the side and swayed side to side with his arms extended out. Velardi began the test, while he performed the test he was unable to keep his hands at his side, he almost fell in between steps 1 and 2, he stopped the test after the first 9 steps and stared at me. I advised Velardi he was supposed to take 9 steps back in the other direction, he began to step and mistepped between steps 1 and 2, he swayed side to side and extended his arms out to maintain his balance. Due to the traffic violations that led to the crash, the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from Velardi's breath, and his failure to pass the psychophysical tests, I placed Velardi under arrest for 39:4-50 Driving While Under the Influence of Alcohol. Velardi was placed into the rear of patrol vehicle 09, the rear seat was searched prior. Velardi was transported to Headquarters to be processed. At Headquarters, Velardi was taken out of patrol vehicle 09 and the rear seat was searched. In Headquarters, Velardi was searched and taken into the booking room.

Ptl. Bennett 279 responded to Headquarters, and operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine (See Ptl. Bennett's supplemental report). Prior to the Alcotest being administered the room was cleared of any unauthorized electronic devices (i.e., portable radios, cellular phones, etc.). At the conclusion of the Alcotest, Ptl. Bennett advised me that Velardi provided sufficient breath samples and his BAC was 0.20%.

Velardi was issued the following summonses:

Velardi was released a short time later to a family member,

who agreed to and signed the strict liability form.

## OfficerID: mbennett, Narrative

On 01/30/2019 I assisted Ptl. Stephenson #278 in acting as Alcotest operator for his DWI arrest of Kyle J. Velardi. I assisted Ptl. Stephenson in escorting Velardi into police headquarters. Once inside, I removed my portable police radio and cellular phone from my person, and secured my service firearm in gun locker #5. I then assisted Ptl. Stephenson in securing Velardi in accordance with departmental policy and placing him in the booking room. Once in the booking room, I visually confirmed that Velardi had no foreign objects inside his mouth (i.e. gum, breath mints, etc.). I then began the twenty minute observation period of Velardi at 1907hrs.

During the observation period, I noticed that Velardi's eyes were watery and blood shot and his speech was slow. I also detected the odor of an alcoholic beverage inside the booking room. While conducting the observation period, I read Velardi the Standard Statement form and he agreed to provide breath samples. I also read him his Miranda Rights and had him sign the Miranda form. After doing so, I questioned him briefly as to what he had consumed. Velardi stated that he initially began consuming alcohol today around 1000hrs at his residence. He stated he later ended up somewhere else but did not want to tell me where. Velardi advised that he was drinking Moosehead beer and fireball whiskey, and advised that he consumed approximately thirty drinks between the two throughout the day.

At 1927hrs, I turned off my body worn camera and removed it from the booking room along with the camera phone used to take mug shots while Ptl. Stephenson remained inside the room with Velardi. Ptl. Stephenson had previously removed his portable police radio and cellular phone and secured them in another room. I then entered back into the booking room and began entering the required information into the Alcotest unit. I was able to obtain two acceptable breath samples from Velardi. His blood alcohol content was determined to be 0.20%BAC. The results were later entered into the Alcotest calculator by police dispatch and found to be within the allowable tolerances.

## OfficerID: mhentges, Narrative

On 01/31/19 at 2207 hours Ptl. Bailey #293 and I responded to the area of Burnt Tavern Rd/ Sweeney Ave in reference to an accident.

On arrival I observed a female later identified as Jamie Lewis standing in the front of a green Jeep Wrangler bearing NJ registration T92JWY with Ptl. Bailey. While speaking with Lewis about the accident I was able to detect a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from her breath. While waking back to her car Lewis was off balance and while searching for her documents Lewis became boisterous and started yelling that a vehicle struck her on the side sending her off road. I asked Lewis to follow me to Carole Ave which was a short distance from her vehicle so we could attempt to take psychophysical tests. While walking to Carole Ave Lewis was swaying and staggering. Lewis stopped on our way to Carole Ave and stated, "You mind as well take me now." Lewis then began to state that she was not driving the vehicle and that she was in the passengers seat. She then stated that she had been drinking but that she was not the one driving the vehicle.

EMS arrived on scene and Lewis advised that she did not need to be seen by them. When asked by EMS who was driving the vehicle she stated "I was." I then conducted psychophysical tests to see if Lewis was impaired from alcohol and/or medication/drugs.

When asked if she had any medical conditions that would prohibit and/or affect her ability to the taking of the field sobriety tests, Lewis stated

The field sobriety test/examinations were conducted in a well-lit, flat area free from any type of large cracks or debris.

The first examination conducted was the One-Leg-Stand test. While explaining and demonstrating the test, I observed Lewis swaying front to back in the starting position. Lewis attempted to start the test multiple times while I was explaining/demonstrating the test. While performing the test Lewis lifted her right leg and counted to four before putting her leg down. She then tried with her left leg and she immediately dropped it. She attempted one more time with her left leg and counted to two before dropping her leg.

The second examination conducted was the Walk and Turn test. While explaining and demonstrating the test, I observed Lewis to sway front to back in the starting position. Lewis also lost balance in the starting position one time and had to reset herself. While explaining/demonstrating the test Lewis attempted to start the test two times before being instructed to begin. After I fully demonstrated and explained the examination, Lewis had no questions and was instructed to begin. While performing the test Lewis lifted her arms above her hips for balance and took nine steps forward and did not touch heal-to-toe on any of the steps. After turning Lewis walked forward nine steps without touching heal-to-toe on any of the steps.

Due to the motor vehicle accident (see Ptl. Bailey's report same case#), the odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from Lewis' breath, and her failure to successfully conduct the psychophysical tests I placed her under arrest for driving under the influence of alcohol or medications/drugs (Handcuffs double locked). Lewis was transported to HQ by me without incident. Ptl. Bailey remained at the scene and awaited PPTD Towing Co. to respond and impound the vehicle under John's Law.

While at HQ Lewis became combative and uncooperative. She would not comply with any of our commands and refused to have her photos taken. Lewis became non compliant while attempting to secure her during the booking process. She pulled away multiple times while we attempted to handcuff and belt her. She was eventually secured and escorted the Booking/DWI processing room for booking. Lewis attempted to spit at Ptl. Bailey but due to her dry mouth was unable to do so. Lewis started to scream and cry while we explained the booking procedure. While Lewis was in cell #1 she sat down on the floor and started crying. Sgt. Donnelly #212 and I went into the cell and asked her if she was okay. Her demeanor changed and she stated that she was fine she was just scared. Lewis advised that she did not need any medical attention.

On scene and at HQ Lewis went through a myriad of emotions ranging from crying, anger, acts of aggression, and cooperative and understanding.

Ptl. Bennett #279 operated the Alcotest 7110 MKIII-C machine (See Ptl. Bennett's supplemental report for further information). At the conclusion of the Alcotest Ptl. Bennett advised me that Lewis refused to provide any breath samples.

## OfficerID: mbennett, Narrative

On 01/31/2019 I assisted Ptl. M. Hentges #288 in acting as Alcotest operator for his DWI arrest of Jamie E. Lewis. Upon arrival at headquarters, I secured my service firearm in locker #1 and removed my portable police radio from my person. Ptl. Hentges escorted Lewis inside and brought her into cell block area #1 to be better secured in compliance with departmental policy. Lewis was completely belligerent and uncooperative. She insisted on using the bathroom and smoking a cigarette before complying with any other commands. Eventually, she calmed down enough so she could be escorted into the booking room.

Once inside the booking room, I visually confirmed that there were no foreign objects inside Lewis' mouth (i.e. gum, breath mints, etc.) I then began the twenty minute observation period of Lewis at 2251hrs. During the observation period, I began to read Lewis the N.J. Attorney General's Standard Statement form. As I was reading the statement, Lewis immediately began saying "No" to what I was reading. I explained that I needed to read the entire statement and then she could provide her answer at the end. I then finished reading the statement to her. At the end when I asked "Will you submit the samples of your breath", Lewis began rambling on and would not directly answer the question. I then advised that her answer was not acceptable and read the final paragraph. At the end of the paragraph, I asked again if she would submit to breath samples. Lewis stated that her answer was "No Answer". She then again continued to ramble on about what I read her stating that everything did not make any sense. At this time, I advised Sgt. Donnelly #212 that Lewis was a refusal.

I deactivated my body worn camera and handed it to Sgt. Donnelly so he could store it on the docking station. As I was entering the required information into the Alcotest unit, Lewis began to kick the desk that the unit was resting on. I advised her several times to stop kicking the desk. She then began to kick the back of the Alcotest unit. I got in between Lewis and the machine and pushed her to the other side of the bench so she could no longer kick the Alcotest unit. Because of her belligerent and erratic/destructive behavior, Lewis was removed from the booking room and secured in cell #1. I then finished entering the information into the Alcotest unit and completed the refusal process. The print out from the unit was then signed and provided to Ptl. Hentges for his case folder.

On 01-23-2019 at approximately 2300 hours, I Ptl. Person #262 was on patrol in marked vehicle #31 in the area of Cedar Bridge Avenue and Jackson Avenue. I observed a maroon GMC pickup drive around the Wawa parking lot (595 Brick Boulevard) at a high rate of speed. I observed the same vehicle fail to stop at a stop sign located at the Wawa exit on Cedar Bridge Avenue. I then observed the vehicle make a right turn onto Cedar Bridge Avenue and then a right turn onto Jackson Avenue without signaling. The pickup stopped in the middle of the intersection and opened its driver side door. As I approached the driver, I asked him for his vehicle's documents and advised him of the reason for the stop. The female then attempted to approach me and the vehicle and I told her stop and wait on the other side of the street. Sgt. Feeney #200 and Ptl. Gordon #297 arrived to assist me.

The driver, identified as Kyle Clarkson, advised me he and his girlfriend had an argument nearby. He advised it was never physical. The female was identified as advised she was fine and wanted to leave with Clarkson. As I spoke to Clarkson, I detected the odor of both raw and burnt marijuana. I asked Clarkson if there was any marijuana inside the vehicle and he responded "no". I advised Clarkson that I smelled marijuana and asked him if it had been recently in the vehicle and he advised me that he smoked a few hours ago in front of his house. I illuminated the interior of his vehicle with my flashlight and observed a zip lock bag which contained suspect marijuana in the center of his vehicle underneath his radio. I then advised Clarkson to step out of the vehicle. I retrieved the suspect marijuana from the vehicle. I then placed Clarkson under arrest, handcuffed him behind his back, double-locked, and placed him into the rear of my patrol vehicle. A search of the vehicle revealed two more zip lock bags which contained suspect marijuana. I transported Clarkson, his property, and the suspect marijuana to the Brick Township Police Department for processing without incident.

On 01/30/2019 at 2054 hours I, Ptl. Docherty #275 was on patrol in the area of Lanes Mill Road / Burnt Tavern Road operating marked patrol vehicle #19. During this time, I observed a gold colored Honda sedan bearing NJ registration LEGM90 traveling south on Lanes Mill Road. I further observed the driver switch lanes a total of two (2) times without using his turn signal. As I paced the driver of the vehicle I observed him traveling approximately 60 mph in a 40 mph speed limit zone on Lanes Mill Road.

A search of the vehicle revealed the following evidence:

Upon completion of the search I advised Gonzalez he was under arrest for possessing CDS (controlled dangerous substance). He was handcuffed to the rear, utilizing a double locking mechanism. On 01/14/2019 at 1747 hrs I observed a white Lincoln Town car bearing NJ registration MX317W in the area of the 7 Eleven on Burnt Tavern Road. The suspect vehicle had no license plates lights and pulled into the parking lot. The suspect vehicle did not stop in the parking lot but attempted to turn left out of the parking lot where there is a sign that stated right turns only. Once the driver, later identified as Joanna Smith, realized I was behind her, she turned her left turn signal off and made a right onto Burnt Tavern Road. The suspect vehicle immediately crossed over 3 lanes to the left most lane without signaling. I followed the vehicle northbound onto Lanes Mill Road and observed the vehicle swerve over the lane markings onto the right shoulder. Smith then turned her left turn signal on in the area of Primrose lane and came to a complete stop in the middle of the roadway, this cause myself and numerous vehicles to stop behind her until she realized there was nowhere to turn off of the roadway in that direction.

I conducted a stop on the suspect vehicle in the area of Lanes Mill School. I approached the vehicle on the passenger side and observed Smith break a cigarette in half and throw it in the ash tray. I asked Smith for her required motor vehicle documents. Smith's hands were shaking as she struggled to locate the documents in the glove box. She closed the glove box and handed me an expired registration card. I asked Smith numerous times to provide me with her license, insurance and registration, she stated that she did not have a driver's license and that it was suspended. Ptl. Person 262 arrived on scene to assist. I again asked her for the registration and insurance, she went to reach into the center console but stopped herself twice. I asked her to check to center console for the documents, when she opened it, I observed a hypodermic syringe and several prescription pill bottles. Due to Smiths behavior and the amount of traffic on the roadway, Smith stepped out of the vehicle onto the side of the road where we could safely speak. While I spoke to Smith, she stated that she did not know where she was going and that she had been in drug court for cocaine and heroin. Smith was unable to speak in complete sentences and struggled to talk on the phone to her friend. Smith placed her hands into her pockets several times and several times I asked her to keep her hands out. She again placed her hands in her pockets and I patted her down to ensure she did not have any weapons. While I patted Smith down I immediately felt two small straws inside of her right pants pocket which based on my training and experience are utilized to ingest a controlled dangerous substance. Based on Smith's admitted history with narcotics and her nervous behavior, I observed the straws further and discovered a white powdery substance on the inside. Smith stated that the straws were in the car when she got in, that they did not belong to her.

Smith's son, ), was in the rear passenger seat during the stop. Smith called her friend, who Smith allowed to respond and take custody of Ptl. Newlund 285 transported and to her residence at

Smith was placed under arrest in violation of 2C:36-2 Possession of Drug Paraphernalia. She was handcuffed and place in the rear of patrol car 09, the rear seat was searched prior to her entering the vehicle. Ptl. Person then advised me that while I handcuffed Smith, she dropped a small white pill onto the ground which he observed her take out of her left pants pocket. The white oval pill that was recovered had no identification markings on it. Smith stated that it was "Wellbutrin". A search of the suspect vehicle revealed another cut straw in the driver's seat which was similar to the straws found on Smith's person. The vehicle was secured and the registered owner was notified of its location.

Smith was transported to Headquarters, processed and released on 1506 S 2019 000040 2C:35-10A(1) Possession of CDS and 2C:36-2 Possession of Drug Paraphernalia. Det. Nixon 209 was advised of the incident. I advised the registered owner of the vehicle, that I had recovered his car keys, registration, insurance, three prescription pill bottles and a hypodermic syringe from the vehicle. tated that he would not pick up the pill bottles and syringe, that he wanted us to discard them. They were placed into property for destruction.
